The Annenberg School of Nursing (ASN), a program of the Los Angeles Jewish Home, is one of the nation's leading nursing schools. Located on the Home's Hirsch Family Campus in the San Fernando Valley, ASN offers comprehensive vocational nurse, nurse assistant, and home health aide programs. Our programs provide students the opportunity to work with a variety of patients, residents, and other healthcare professionals.

At ASN, classes are taught in an interactive format combining classroom instruction with hands-on practice. Our small class size provides personalized instruction. Individual and group assistance is available. Our pass rates are consistently above state averages. Tuition for ASN programs are all-inclusive. Financial aid is available for VN students who qualify.

Vocational Nursing Program

The comprehensive vocational nurse program at the Annenberg School of Nursing prepares you to take the NCLEX-PN® state licensing exam. The 12-month class meets daily Monday thru Friday. Curriculum content includes anatomy and physiology, pharmacology, fundamentals of nursing, and medical surgical nursing. In addition, obstetrics/maternal child nursing is taught with the assistance of a birthing manikin. The program consists of 1680 hours, 1041 clinical and 639 theory.

The vocational nursing program is designed to provide students with the knowledge and skills necessary for an entry-level position as a vocational nurse in a medical office, clinic, HMO, acute care hospital, long-term care facility or other healthcare settings in which vocational nurses are employed.

Nursing Assistant

The certified nursing assistant program at the Annenberg School of Nursing meets Monday thru Friday from 6:45 a.m. to 3:15 p.m. and prepares students for the state certification examination. The program consists of 60 hours of theory and 116 clinical hours.

Curriculum includes patients' rights, safety procedures, the aging process, personal care,

vital signs, admissions, transfer and discharges, death and dying, time management, and specific state requirements for certified nursing assistants.

Home Health Aide

The Annenberg School of Nursing's home health aide program trains students to help people who are elderly, disabled, chronically ill, or cognitively impaired. Home health aides assist with activities such as bathing and dressing, and provide other services, such as light housekeeping, meal preparation, medication assistance and transportation assistance. Home health aides work mainly in private homes. The five day (40 hours) program meets Monday through Friday from 6:45 a.m. to 3:15 p.m.
